Worth Considering -

"Why Do Churches Grow?" is the title of a recently completed doctoral dissertation by Indiana District Mission Executive Geoff Robinson, a former CID pastor. His research identified, in three LCMS Districts, churches that had shown a sustained increase in attendance. Geoff asked the pastors and lay leaders in these churches about factors that either contributed to or worked against an increase in church-going. All the congregations were in the Indiana, South Wisconsin, and *Central Illinois* Districts. Geoff's findings are worth considering.

Tending to *increase* church attendance:

- Worship: overall quality of services, but especially preaching. Most of the congregations surveyed use liturgical or traditional worship.
- Lutheran ethos: emphasis on Word and Sacraments, faithful teaching, Bible study, catechesis. Small group Bible study was mentioned, but not to a major extent.
- Welcoming newcomers: friendly congregations, in which people relate positively to visitors.
 "Fellowship" was noticed more by lay leaders than pastors. Assimilation is important; when missing, it can become a major factor working against church attendance.
- Intentional outreach: Churches with growing attendance pay prime attention to evangelism.
 Pastors must place a high priority on it and lead in it, also by personal example. Pastors go out of their way to converse with people they do not know, and laypeople cultivate relationships with people outside the church, all for the sake of telling the Good News about Jesus. Some congregations as a whole develop community connections. A significant subset of outreach efforts have to do with young people. Among these, Lutheran schools came up most often. Also mentioned were other

- forms of children's ministry, as well as free-standing preschools.
- Pastoral leadership was also identified as a factor contributing to rising church attendance – not pastors micro-managing, but instead helping a congregation to state a vision and enabling staff and lay leaders to organize.
- "Growth": congregational membership increasing not only by transfers from other LCMS churches but also via converts from other denominations; births of more babies within congregations; more people living in community (noticed more by laypeople than pastors).

Tending to *decrease* church attendance:

- Lack of commitment: competing activities for kids and adults, apathy toward church, also competition from other churches. Related to:
- "Spiritual concerns": pervasive worldly culture and the church's counter-cultural message.
 (Respondents did not necessarily object to this counter-cultural message, but they recognized that some people are offended by it.)
- Pastors neglecting members, isolating themselves, and preaching poor sermons
- Inward focus: churches resting content without intentional evangelism or assimilation efforts
- Building and location (which can be "plusses," but may stick out more if they are "minuses"): shrinking population in neighborhood, limited parking and space problems at church.

From the above, I observe, in general:

- 1. Intentional outreach helps church attendance.
- 2. Consider what you are inviting newcomers TO!
