Worth considering:

Psalm 67, the Reformation, and Gospel Outreach Part Two

Last month we drew basic points Psalm 67, a mission psalm. We also noted the church's need for the kind of help that would fall in line with what this psalm says. Such help is available to us in the heritage of the Lutheran Reformation. Years ago, my former professor C. George Fry noted in a Christianity Today article (Oct. 25, 1968) that the Lutheran Reformation amounted to an evangelistic movement. Drawing on his work, I observe that:

1. The Reformation was the rediscovery of the Gospel. When Luther "began to understand that the righteousness of God is that through which the righteous live by a gift of God, namely by faith . . . I felt [said Luther] as if I were entirely born again and had entered paradise through gates that had been flung open. An entirely new side of the Scriptures had opened itself to me " The Lord brought Luther to see that the righteousness of God was for him in Christ. Today some urge upon us socalled "missional" thinking which claims that the church is here not for its members, but for the unchurched. Luther would have been appalled at this one-sidedness. His rediscovery of the Gospel was all about faithfully receiving from God through His Word in the church the salvation bought and paid for by Christ. So Luther paraphrased Psalm 67:

> May God bestow on *us* His grace, with blessings rich provide *us*; And may the brightness of His face to life eternal guide *us* (*LSB* 823:1)

2. The Reformation was the revival of biblical proclamation. For preaching to be any good, it has to center upon the grace of God in

Christ. Nor should this Christ come from any human devising. He must be the Savior proclaimed in the Scriptures. For the human heart's workrighteousness always seeks a way to desert God's real gift in Christ and to assert itself. How can we reach out and extend the gift to others if our hands are filled with sin-spoiled achievements of our own making? But when God's blessings overflow our hands and our hearts, they spill into the lives of others. Therefore Luther sang:

That we His saving health may know, His gracious will and pleasure,
And also to the nations show Christ's riches without measure
And unto God convert them. (LSB 823:1)

3. The Reformation saw the

interdependence between evangelism and education. For example: it takes a biblically trained eye to see that mission to the Gentiles and salvation by grace for Christ's sake through faith form two sides of the same coin, and therefore to understand that our mission psalm, Psalm 67, presumes justification by faith. Evangelism itself presumes the doctrine of justification. This teaching needs to be re-taught, both to kill our own self-righteousness and to give us the gracious "God's-eye" view of ourselves and others, as stated by St. Paul: "the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation for all people" (Titus 2:11). If the nations are to believe in the Lord as their God, they must hear His Word. Luther was not off the psalm's point when he sang:

Thy people's pasture is Thy Word
Their souls to feed and nourish,
In righteous paths to keep them (LSB 823:2)
