The evangelist Philip had no confusion about this matter. He "opened his mouth, and . . . told" a man from Ethiopia "the good news of *Jesus*" (Acts 8:35).

THE Good News is the Gospel of the Christ Who died for poor sinners and rose again. He loved you and gave Himself for you. When St. Paul wrote the Corinthians, he reminded them that this was the Gospel by which they were saved (1 Corinthians 15:2). Here's a matter of death and life, eternally!

President's Desk

"Give Me Liberty!"

Everyone on earth wants freedom, but the definitions attached to such differ. When Patrick Henry first spoke the words above, he, with many others, sought a separate destiny apart from the tyranny of the homeland and its king. Freedom is to be oppressed no longer. Freedom evokes opportunity not available under the prevailing circumstances. Freedom is the ability to chart one's own path without interference or obstacle. Most often, however, most sinners have confused freedom with license and in our having no further obligation to any authority. This latter definition is just a new kind of slavery.

Israel thought that their "Chosen People" status gave them license to do as they pleased without ever being called into question. The world, in general, does not believe that it will ever be called to account for the evil it perpetrates. Each of us feels we have gotten away with our indiscretions and our greater offenses so long as we remain undetected. Our conscience bears witness that we are quick to abuse liberty so that every pleasure might become ours to enjoy to the full. Every rule is meant to be broken for the sake of liberty. All things have become lawful and beneficial despite what St. Paul said to the contrary.

Christ freely gave up His heavenly throne to take on an obligation toward His fallen creation. He came to establish liberty for those whose independent uprising had enslaved them to death and destruction. The object of His love was thoughtlessly traveling down a path that he was convinced was truly free, but such "freedom" was just a myth or a mirage. Christ's mission was to attach freedom and pardon, getting to the very root of mankind's dilemma. There is no freedom for us apart from our sin and rebellion being duly dealt with.

The whole of Scripture is focused on our Christ and Savior, who, from the time of our false start toward our own divinity and wrong turn away from our Creator, sought to fulfill the first Gospel promise to crush the serpent's head and reverse the effects of death now claiming creation and creature. From the start Christ sought our freedom from death and hell.

Throughout His life, Jesus kept the Law perfectly, in our behalf. He was obedient to His Father in every respect, for us. Though innocent, He became the sacrifice for a world full of sin and sinners, and with His resurrection from the dead gained liberty from what had oppressed us and freedom to become the "sons of God." Jesus became to us the open gate into the Kingdom of God. He set the foundation of true Freedom!

Our trespasses have been forgiven in Christ and are no longer held against us. This is true of the whole world! That frees our conscience of the terror and turmoil of guilt! That then places us under a new and free obligation.

Ben Franklin, following the Constitutional Convention of 1787, is said to have responded to a question from Mrs. Powell of Philadelphia, "What have we got, a republic or a monarchy?" He said, "A republic, if you can keep it!"

With freedom goes a certain obligation, first, not to give way and unleash all of one's common urges, but to walk in liberty, carefully and well-disciplined. So, we have been justified by grace through faith in Christ alone, should we then sin more that we might be forgiven more? Certainly not, responds St. Paul.

Luther pointed out the paradox that is Christian Freedom. He wrote, "A Christian is an utterly free man, lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is an utterly dutiful man, servant of all, subject to all." Yes, we are set free by the Gospel so that we live in the hope that no one can snatch us from His hand, but at the same time Christian love obligates us to our God and neighbor. We have been given

liberty but not to become subject again to the slavery of sin. We ought to give a testimony to the hope that is within us which the Bible has taught us when we were turned to Jesus as our conqueror who makes us more than conquerors.

The Mission of Christ's Church, and all its members, is to share this good news that the captive has been released, the sinner has been pardoned, and that heaven is open to everyone because of the all-availing sacrifice of God's Son in behalf of the lost and enslaved of the world. We were lost, standing apart from our loving Father. We were enslaved to sin so that it was our only preferred lifestyle. We were dead, blind, God's enemies until Jesus' life and blood made a difference in how we were viewed from heaven. We are now, in the sight of God, truly free!

We have been reconciled so that we might be ambassadors of the message and ministry of reconciliation. The Liberty Bell bears this inscription: "Proclaim Liberty Throughout All the Land Unto All the Inhabitants thereof." The people who have been pardoned with a pardon meant for all, couldn't... shouldn't... wouldn't... we ring out blood-bought liberty to family, friend, and foe alike, as an act of Christian love in the mold of Christ who gave Himself for all! God grant that by so living, believing, and doing we will be known as the sons of God's liberty!

While he was imprisoned, the apostle Paul prayed for an open door. Yet he did not have in mind an exit from his imprisonment. Selflessly, he invited the church at Colossae to "pray for us also, that God may open to us a door for the Word" (Colossians 4:3).

The pandemic caused prison doors to close to the Word, as visits by outside chaplains and others were curtailed for health and security reasons. As these words are written, we anticipate that Illinois state prisons will open to our chaplains soon. This would be a welcome wider opening for prison ministry.

Meanwhile, CID prison ministry efforts are in the process of opening wider still. One of the lessons learned from the pandemic is the importance of ways and means to get the Word into prisons even when chaplains cannot go in.

Prison Ministry Coordinator Rev. Rodney Blomquist is laying plans to expand the number of prisons and jails served with resources, and to involve more congregations, their pastors and members in the process. This wider opening is being supported in large part by Central Illinois LWML, which has decided to award a generous \$10,000 grant for resourcing and restructuring of CID Prison Ministry. Roughly two-thirds of this amount will be for the provision of materials and the other third for training of volunteers.

Circuit Convocation on Recruitment

On Pentecost Sunday, May 23, CID's Shelby and Effingham Circuits held a joint Circuit Convocation focusing on church worker recruitment, especially the recruitment of future pastors. Dr. Dale Meyer, President Emeritus of Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, was the featured speaker. Our two seminaries were represented, as well as Concordia Universities in Chicago and Wisconsin, LCMS Ministry to the Armed Forces, and Camp CILCA.

Some 65 people attended. Among them were seven men who are considering studying to become pastors.

The convocation offered several special interest sessions. Some specifically spoke of the challenges and joys of serving full-time in the church. Others focused on the educational paths to church work careers. Still others gave ideas on how to encourage others (sons, daughters, grandchildren, friends, and fellow church members in general) toward such service — for example:

- As you mull over "what to do for a living," consider being a full-time church worker FIRST. There may be reasons to move beyond this option to others, but maybe not.
- Congregations can set up prominent displays to put everyone in mind of all their sons and daughters from that church who have gone into full time church work.

As Jesus said, "pray . . . the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest"!



CID YOUTH BIBLE BOWL

The twenty-second annual CID Youth Bible Bowl (after missing last year due to the pandemic) took place on Sunday afternoon, April 18, 2021, via e-mail and phone. Three teams from two circuits participated by answering questions about "The Exodus."

The championship team was from Zion Lutheran Church, Taylor Ridge, with a record of 3 and 1. Team members were: Kiersten Fuhr, Holly Fuhr, Taylor Hofer, and Jakob Hofer. Second place went to the team from Holy Cross, Moline, with a 2 and 2 record. Team members were: Max Serre, Emma Noah, Taylor Lohse, and Alex Serre. Third place went to St. Paul's, Lexington. Team members were Jadyn Reimer, Jillian Reimer, and Tanner Laesch. This is the first time a team from Lexington ever participated in the CID Youth Bible Bowl. Welcome!

After months of study by the youth, this year's Bible Bowl was quite different from previous years. At least we had one this year. Instead of using a buzzer system to determine which team got to answer each question, the quizmaster e-mailed an entire match of 15 questions to both teams in the match. Each team answered all the questions they could via reply e-mail. If there had been any ties in the number of correct answers, the team which sent in its answers first would have won. Many matches were close, but not quite that close. There was a delay of quite a few minutes before each team learned how well they did, instead of learning the correct answer immediately (as we do in-person).

Here is what some of the participants thought of the electronic format:

"This year's format prompted a lot of challenging questions and some absolutely amazing discussion within the team. Everyone present sure did learn a lot!"

Or, more succinctly, from the winning group: "It was too long." But "there was better collaboration." The lack of immediate feed-back for answers, and the quizmaster's need to check two sets of answers for each match did add to the time involved. And, of course, the participants could not learn from matches in which they were not involved. (And no audience could learn from the experience.) As former CID Education exec. Glenn Goeres used to say: watching a Bible Bowl in this format "would be as interesting as watching paint dry." So, God willing, we'll get back to in-person, buzzer-and-all, audible circuit and District Bible Bowls next year.

The Bible Bowl is open to junior and senior high youth from any congregation in the CID. Circuits who are interested in holding a Bible Bowl should contact the Bible Bowl coordinator, Pastor Mark Eddy at Taylor Ridge, or Mr. Trip Rodgers at the CID office. Next year's Bible Bowl will cover some part of the New Testament. God willing, the topic will be announced in October. "Blessed are those who hear the Word of God and keep it!" (Luke 11:28).

Lutheran Legacy donated \$10,000 to each of these endowments initially, and it also matched the first \$10,000 given to each of the four funds.

Now Lutheran Legacy has announced a generous extension of its matching funds offer. It is going to continue providing dollar-for-dollar matching contributions to each of the endowments for an additional \$10,000, for donations made by July 1, 2022.

So another way to support campus ministry is to alert alumni of these four campus ministries, or their parents and other family members, to this significant opportunity. This effort too can become part of *Keeping Christ on Campus*.

The psalmist prayed to the Lord, "Send out your light and your truth; let them lead me; let them bring me to your holy hill and to your dwelling!" (Psalm 43:3). Our Synod says: "College is tough. You need Jesus. We'll help."

Growth Bond Program is Ending

Through its Growth Bond Program, the Central Illinois District Church Extension Fund (CID-CEF) has encouraged the young members of our congregations to save up their treasures while supporting the growth of the LCMS and God's Kingdom in the CID. Many of our youth have taken advantage of this program, but the time has now come to bring the program to an end.

The CID-CEF will initiate the following steps to bring the Growth Bond Program to a close:

- All unused stamps not yet in booklets will be refunded at stamp face value upon presentation.
- All stamps in booklets, partial or full, will be refunded at stamp face value upon presentation.
- Growth Bonds that have not yet reached maturity will be allowed to reach maturity value. At that time, the Growth Bond will be redeemed, or the owner may have the option to reinvest in a CID-CEF Flexible Savings Account or Investment Certificate where qualified and permissible to do so.
- Growth Bonds that have matured will, after a 60-day notification period, be redeemed at their current value, or the owner
 may have the option to reinvest in a CID-CEF Flexible Savings Account or Investment Certificate where qualified and
 permissible to do so.

Please submit all unused stamps and stamps in booklets for redemption by December 31, 2021, to the CID-CEF (1850 N. Grand Ave. W., Springfield, IL 62702). We ask churches and schools to please communicate this request as necessary to members of their congregations and schools.

Communications regarding redemption of Growth Bonds already purchased will be sent 60 days in advance of their maturity or redemption as a reminder of this change and to allow reinvestment, where qualified and permissible to do so.

We thank you for participating in the Growth Bond Program and pray that your youth have likewise grown spiritually from the knowledge that they have assisted with reaching souls by providing the use of their treasures to build and grow our churches and schools in the CID.
