My Ministry During COVID:

Pastor's View

COVID has affected us and challenged us in ways we have never seen in our lifetimes. We all know full well about the cancellations, shuts downs, social distancing, employment challenges and supply shortages related to the virus. Then there are the health concerns with the possibility of getting COVID or dealing with COVID once we have it. COVID has brought more than disruption and inconvenience. It has brought an overabundance of fear and anxiety to people's lives.

The Church, too, has faced many challenges during COVID. The first challenge was when we were forced to shut our doors. How do we continue to bring the Word of God into people's lives? How will we weather this financially? When we could reopen, how do we balance protecting people's health with providing worship and spiritual growth and fellowship opportunities?

One can look at all of the challenges COVID has brought into our lives and wonder "Where is God in all of this?" The answer is so simple that we may overlook it. Instead of thinking that a trial is an absence of God's presence or blessings, we need to see God's presence in the trial. God is right where He has always been, in His Word and Sacraments. The Gospel, that "one thing necessary" (Luke 10:42), is especially important when fears increase and uncertainly abounds.

Thanks be to God that nothing... NOTHING... can separate us from Our Father and His love.

James, in writing to Jewish Christians undergoing difficulties, writes: "Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing." (1:2-4) Even when we lack the safety and security of normal, daily, mundane life, and life is thrown into turmoil with trials, we lack nothing spiritually as we cling to Christ and the Gospel. Salvation was, is, and always is ours through faith in Christ.

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President's Desk

"Evangelical Frustrations"

My lunch time reading during the last few years has been the three-volume biography of Martin Luther by Martin Brecht. It is very detailed, and following Luther's reformation career, it leads to some extraordinary conclusions by the elder Luther that just confirmed tendencies he had observed in his younger years. At times he took shots at the government (nobles) who seemed to use their office and power to improve their own circumstances and that of few others. At other times the shopkeepers were the target for their greed and failure to think of society's needs over and against their own. The peasants could be criticized for their ungodly lifestyles and desertion of the church. Not much ever changed in his view of the Romanists and the Sacramentarians and their desertion of the clear Word of God and the comfort it rendered.

Frustrations will come, but the Lord Jesus has routed our enemies so that they have not and cannot overcome.

In 1545, Luther concluded, "What are we preaching? It would be better if we would quit... It seems that everything is lost" [Brecht, Vol. 3, p. 262]. At this point, Luther thought of leaving Wittenberg just a little over a half year before his death. It was depressing for the old Luther that after thirty years of evangelical preaching conditions were worse than before [Brecht, Vol. 3, p. 261].

Luther had been optimistic that the widespread dissemination of the pure Gospel would affect mankind, at least his fellow Wittenbergers, more powerfully for the good. He never lost sight of the fact that this world is sinful and is, in many ways, ruled from hell.

Yet, in proclaiming Christ he thought that the freedom of forgiveness earned by Jesus' blood would have a more salutary effect on Christian living among his contemporaries. Was this a moment when Luther was succumbing to a theology of glory?

No, I think that after a lengthy time in the pulpit most preachers would like to think that they are listened to, and that God's Word would have freer reign in the lives of listeners. Luther sought to make it clear that people had to listen to him and the other pastors not because of their personal authority but because they were Christ's servants who were responsible for their souls [Brecht, Vol. 3, p. 257]. Besides, Jesus himself admonished that "The one who hears you hears Me, and the one who rejects you rejects Me, and the one who rejects Me rejects Him who sent Me" [St. Luke 10:16]. The preacher expects that Christians would mind a word of life rather than that of death. But we are still dealing with sin and sinners in a fallen world and a devil who is still very active.

Frustrations will come, but the task still lies before us, namely, to take up the mantle of the prophet under any and all circumstances, "in season and out," and to faithfully encourage, evangelize, exhort, rebuke, admonish, preach and proclaim His Word and most especially "the acceptable year of the Lord" that the sinner might yet "turn from his evil ways, and live."

Frustrations will come, as obstacles of all sorts are thrown in front of our parishioners, both temptations and fiery darts, and the faith of many waxes and wanes depending on what's happening now. Nevertheless, the Lord's spokesmen are called to a faithful heralding of the Good News under the shadow of the cross and God's chosen will respond that they will be saved, both the preacher and the preached to.

Frustrations will come, but the Lord Jesus has routed our enemies so that they have not and cannot overcome. Though they may win little

battles, the greater war's end has already been settled. One little word can fell them. By the blood of Jesus our sins are forgiven, both of the preacher and of those preached to, in fact, of the whole world! The same Gospel victory is proclaimed to the hearts of preacher and preached to alike, and we are revived. Jesus stands vindicated as the sacrificed Lamb who stands as the resurrected Conqueror of sin, death, the devil and the grave. Amidst all frustrations, we hear the calming and comforting voice of our heavenly Father inviting us into His kingdom, not on account of victories we have won, but through the power of the Word that announces that we have been claimed as the children of our heavenly Father, our corruption has been exchanged for a cloak of regal righteousness, and everlasting life belongs to those who trust in Jesus and His blood-bought redemption as their only hope.

Governmental mandates, legislative restraints, persecution, physical and spiritual hostility, lies, and the continual trek of the many on the road that leads to destruction cause the Christian to experience sorrow and frustration even as it seems that given more of the same, we will get sucked in as well. But the Word will never fail the Lord's purpose. It will stand forever! It cannot be broken! It will always be the foundation upon which frustrations are canceled and our comfort is confirmed as we are pointed to our brother and Prince, Jesus, our righteousness, and victory!

My Ministry During COVID:

Parish Nurse's View

The COVID outbreak and eventual shut down resulted in a great many ministry changes and challenges. At a time when the need for ministry was heightened, physical access to those in need was impossible. I couldn't go to the bedside of our hospitalized members or even sit and "wait for news" with their families. I couldn't visit our homebound members facing physical, social, and emotional isolation. Those without technology access for our on-line worship services and Bible studies experienced some spiritual isolation, as well. How do you mix COVID and ministry?

We expanded our card ministry to include 15 more volunteers who offered to send a card every month to the members on their specific list. This "COVID Card Ministry" became hugely successful. Friendships formed between members who previously didn't even know each other! Recipients

looked forward to receiving those cards, a contact from and a connection to, someone in their church family. Some members phoned other members who were known to live alone, just to say 'hi' and check in. Other members went grocery shopping for our atrisk population, leaving the requested items on the doorstep every week. One member called her shopper her 'grocery angel.' We are blessed to be a blessing!


While I helped coordinate these outreach ministries, my personal link to our members came in the form of cards, texts, e-mails, and phone call....lots and lots of phone calls. The longer the pandemic wore on, the longer the phone calls became. People were becoming increasingly more lonely, bored, depressed, anxious, and fearful as the months wore on. Some lost loved ones and needed help grieving in absentia, without benefit of a funeral service. Some needed urging to seek medical/mental health care, fearful of catching COVID if they went out. Others just needed to talk, to be listened to. Some needed information. Others needed comfort and reassurance. All needed prayer. As I write this, the COVID variant is on the rise and COVID may again force us to separate from one another. Thanks be to God that nothing...NOTHING...can separate us from our Father and His love.

This 100-question electronic survey identifies a local church's strengths and weaknesses. The survey is available to LCMS congregations at no cost. Before taking the survey, churches need not commit to any of the *re:Vitality* modules. However, after seeing their survey results, churches may grow interested in one or more of these modules. Connect to Disciple

This module helps a congregation lead people from their initial connection with the church's members to discipleship, being gathered around the Lord's Word and Sacraments with the rest of the congregation. For short, the name is *Connect to Disciple*.

CID also has generous funding from Central Illinois LWML to provide facilitators who can conduct a Friday night–Saturday morning workshop at your church at minimal cost to the congregation. 
Book Study: The Modern Self

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Growth Bond Program is Ending

Through its Growth Bond Program, the Central Illinois District Church Extension Fund (CID-CEF) has encouraged the young members of our congregations to save up their treasures while supporting the growth of the LCMS and God's Kingdom in the CID. Many of our youth have taken advantage of this program, but the time has now come to bring the program to an end.



The CID-CEF will initiate the following steps to bring the Growth Bond Program to a close:

- All unused stamps not yet in booklets will be refunded at stamp face value upon presentation.
- All stamps in booklets, partial or full, will be refunded at stamp face value upon presentation.
- Growth Bonds that have not yet reached maturity will be allowed to reach maturity value. At that time, the Growth Bond will be redeemed, or the owner may have the option to reinvest in a CID-CEF Flexible Savings Account or Investment Certificate where qualified and permissible to do so.
- Growth Bonds that have matured will, after a 60-day notification period, be redeemed at their current value, or the owner
 may have the option to reinvest in a CID-CEF Flexible Savings Account or Investment Certificate where qualified and
 permissible to do so.

Please submit all unused stamps and stamps in booklets for redemption by December 31, 2021, to the CID-CEF (1850 N. Grand Ave. W., Springfield, IL 62702). We ask churches and schools to please communicate this request as necessary to members of their congregations and schools.

Communications regarding redemption of Growth Bonds already purchased will be sent 60 days in advance of their maturity or redemption as a reminder of this change and to allow reinvestment, where qualified and permissible to do so.

We thank you for participating in the Growth Bond Program and pray that your youth have likewise grown spiritually from the knowledge that they have assisted with reaching souls by providing the use of their treasures to build and grow our churches and schools in the CID.

- A Ministry of presence
- The LERT Program and how it works with other responders
- Introduction to Disaster Response
- At the work site: Debris clean up, tarp and patch, flood and mud clean up, chainsaw safety, and necessary paperwork.
