The 60th Regular Convention of the CID July 17-19, 2022 Crowne Plaza Hotel, Springfield, IL

The 60th Convention of the Central Illinois District (CID) of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LCMS) and the 9th Convention of the CID Church Extension Fund, Inc. will be held at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Springfield, Illinois, on July 17-19, 2022. Registration for the convention and business sessions will be held at the Crowne Plaza from 3:00pm to 6:00pm on Sunday, July 17th, and beginning at 7:00am on Monday, July 18th.

All nonvoting ordained and commissioned ministers who are members of the Synod within the District shall serve as advisory delegates. They are entitled to voice and vote on a floor committee, if appointed, and to speaking privileges at the convention. All advisory members are expected to attend all sessions of the convention.

Guests, exhibitors, and others are welcome to attend, but are also to present themselves to the credentials committee at the registration desk for identification purposes.

Registration Fees

Each voting delegate will be assessed a fee of \$135 to cover convention costs and two meals on Monday. Since June 1st, voting delegate registration is now \$185. Nonvoting ordained and commissioned ministers who are actively serving and attending the convention will be assessed a fee of \$40 which does not include meals. If meals are desired add \$80 (\$35 for lunch and \$45 for dinner). For emeritus ordained and commissioned ministers, guests, and exhibitors there is no charge for registration, but the \$80 meal charge applies if meals are desired and at least one week notice of your attendance must be given before the convention convenes. Exhibitor space is available for \$50 per table desired. If an electrical connection is desired, an additional \$40 is required. Exhibitors will be assigned tables and a layout will be available so conventioneers will know where each exhibitor is located.

Schedule

The convention will start with an opening communion service on Sunday, July 17th, at 7:00pm at Trinity Lutheran Church, Springfield (220 South Second Street). Monday morning, July 18th, the sessions begin at 8:00am at the Crowne Plaza and will continue until 9:30pm. The only scheduled breaks are for lunch and dinner. **Bathroom and coffee breaks are on your own.** It is not good stewardship to have everyone heading to those areas at the same time. Our meals will be next door to our convention meeting area. Tuesday, July 19th, the sessions again begin at 8:00am and continue until 12 noon, if necessary. You will be on your own for Tuesday lunch.

Seating

There will be sufficient seating for all delegates in the delegate section. All voting delegates are asked to sit in the designated area. Advisory members and guests will sit in the areas to either side of the Voting Delegates.

Nominees for District President

The following three pastors have received sufficient nominations and have agreed to serve as District President should he be elected at the upcoming Central Illinois District (CID) Convention to be held in Springfield on July 17-19, 2022.

<u>Rev. Karl F. Eckhoff</u>

Biographical information:

A son of The Central Illinois District, I was born in Beardstown, baptized at St. John, Beardstown, and raised in Chatham, IL where the family joined St. John Lutheran, Chatham. As a youth I was active in OAFC and worked at Camp CILCA in various roles including Head Counselor and Program Director. I did my undergraduate work at Concordia, St. Paul, and Christ College, Irvine. From Irvine, I went on to attend Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, where I gained a Masters of Divinity in 1990. My first call was to St. Peter (Bell) Lutheran Church, Waterville, MN, and Bethlehem Lutheran, Elysian, MN, where I served as pastor until 1998. In the spring of that year I took a call to Zion Lutheran Church in Paulina, IA. I was pastor there until 2005 when I answered the call to be the pastor of Christ Lutheran in Peoria, IL. I also now serve as a part-time chaplain at The Lutheran Hillside Village. In these various callings I've had the opportunity to work in multiple parish and single parish settings in both rural and urban communities. I've had the privilege to work with two Lutheran Schools alongside a number of gifted principals. I've assisted several Lutheran Camps and had the opportunity to serve on a number of district boards and committees. Most recently I've served as Chairman of the Board at Camp CILCA and as a member of CID's Endowment Committee.

My wife, Judy, has been my loving partner and supporter in this adventure since 1983. God has blessed us with four children along the way; seven grandchildren with an eighth on the way; and many friends and loved ones.

What I believe the District President's relationship is to District congregations and schools.

In His letter to the church at Ephesus, Paul reminds The Church that Christ gives "the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the shepherds and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ," (Ephesians 4:11-12 ESV). District Presidents aren't specifically listed there, but they clearly do continue to shepherd and teach, as a pastor would in a parish. In this case, it's a

much broader flock that contains many congregations and people. Like a pastor they provide oversight, needed correction; but also encouragement to congregations and those who have been called to serve them - Pastors, Teachers, Principals, Directors of Christian Education and Evangelism, Deaconesses, etc. As much as possible then, the District President visits or sends representatives to listen to needs, provide resources and set a vision for mission opportunities that might require the district's help or the combined efforts of others.

Rev. Mark Eddy

Biographical information:

I was born from above by water and the Spirit at five weeks in Walther Memorial Lutheran Church in Milwaukee, WI. I attended two Missouri Synod churches and parochial grade schools. My father's death when I was 8, my mother's re-marriage, and my second father's adopting me made me concerned about eternal salvation, and led me to deal with traditions and relationships in light of God's Word. Since 1969 the pastor who catechized me also made us aware of the divisions in our Synod, and taught us to rely on "Scripture alone." I attended one year of Lutheran High School, before graduating from a public high school and spending two years in the music school at Northwestern University. I finished the preseminary program at Concordia, Ann Arbor (1979), and graduated from Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, IN, in 1983. I married Nancy in 1981 and helped her home-school our 6 children. I learned a lot on vicarage and in my first parishes about dealing biblically with personal, cultural, and theological differences, and I learned the Bible best by translating it from the original languages. I started STM studies at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, finishing at Fort Wayne in 1993.

What I believe the District President's relationship is to District congregations and schools.

God's Word commands every Christian to love God above all things and to love our neighbors as ourselves. The District president deals with everyone in the District as his neighbors, members of the household of faith, people for whom Christ died, and fellowmembers of Christ's Body, the Church. The District president is assigned by the Synod and District constitution and bylaws to provide specific oversight functions for the congregations and their called workers. A District President should not involve himself in the workings of congregations or schools without being notified by them or their workers that they want his counsel and aid. If congregations and their pastors are working together according to God's word in Christian love, the District president will have little to do for them, until there is a vacancy or Satan attacks. In those cases he helps the congregation call new servants and helps resolve problems according to Scriptures and the Lutheran Confessions. Personal visitation and interaction with the called workers and congregations of the District helps the president to get to know the needs of those whom he serves.

Rev. Michael Mohr

Biographical information:

Rev. Michael Mohr has served in the Central Illinois District since his graduation from Concordia Seminary in St. Louis in 1998. He served as pastor of Grace, Strasburg, 1998-2018 and Holy Cross, Vandalia, 2018-present. He has also spent all but the first year of his ministry serving the district at large, helping plan district pastors conferences, organizing an annual district wide social event (CID Day at the Ballpark), and two terms each as Circuit Counselor, Assistant Secretary, and Secretary of the District. Rev. Mohr just completed service to our LWML-CID as District Pastoral Counselor. In November of 2021, he was appointed to complete the term of Rev. Rick Milas as Eastern Regional Vice President.

What I believe the District President's relationship is to District congregations and schools.

We are called as God's people to walk together in our confession of His unchanging truth. In this life together, we comfort one another with the soothing balm of His grace through His Word proclaimed and His sacraments rightly administered. We teach our children His Word when we rise and when we lie down, as we walk along the way and as we rest. Some of these things are impossible to do on our own; others are more efficiently accomplished when we gather together, so our Lord gathers us into congregations.

But there are some things even congregations are not as well suited to accomplish individually, so we have gathered together as a Synod. The Central Illinois District, as Synod in this place, is able to pool resources to assist congregations and schools, pastors and teachers, in the task of equipping the saints, preparing every believer to give an answer and bear witness of the hope that is ours in Christ Jesus. This most commonly occurs in training resources and workshops that are available, but also includes counsel and supervision regarding good and godly practices to make that good confession, especially in a world hostile to the Word of God. District also assists congregations in helping train (at the broader, Synodical level) and match pastors, teachers, and other commissioned workers to avenues of service in our congregations and schools. Finally, the district coordinates efforts and resources of all the congregations collectively in establishing new congregations and mission starts and supporting work among specialized populations, such as those in prison, those displaced from their home congregations as they attend college or university, those in a Hispanic cultural community, or those of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing community.

This summer, 16 CID churches are wrapping up a year of access to a suite of financial education and tracking tools that the District was able to give them, thanks to a generous grant from Church Extension Fund. These tools, all from the Dave Ramsey organization (known best for "Financial Peace University"), come in a bundle called "Ramsey Plus."

Here's how Ramsey Plus has gone for one congregation, the Lutheran Church of St. John in Quincy. Their answers to *The GatePost's* questions below have been edited a bit for space.

Q: What were you expecting when your church started with Ramsey Plus?

RAMSEY+

A: The Ramsey Plus course offerings of Financial Peace University (FPU), Smart Money-Smart Kids, and The Legacy Journey appeared to address a number of decades along life's journey. We expected FPU to help people learn biblical principles of the earning years: getting and staying out of debt, building an emergency fund, paying off their mortgage early, saving for their children's college years, and building wealth for retirement. Smart Money-Smart Kids would help parents teach their children about managing money based on those same principles. The Legacy Journey would provide the basis for leaving a legacy of financial peace for future generations, to include charitable giving as God promised to bless in Malachi.

Q: What was the best thing about your church's year of access with Ramsey Plus?

A: We were able to truly change the lives of the households attending FPU and Smart Money-Smart Kids. We had families who are now on their journey to financial freedom in ways they never thought possible. We have seen those families able to reduce their household debt significantly in just a few months. They are seeing what it means to have financial peace, many for the first time in their adult lives!

Q: What challenges did Ramsey Plus present you?

A: The biggest challenge was getting people to agree to attend the courses. We tried many different ways to publicize the courses to get greater participation. It was disappointing to have so few households willing to commit to attend training. We know they urgently need to learn and live these Biblical principles, for their own well-being and the well-being of their families. If we could just get them to understand that they are living a "generational curse" of financial bondage, and passing that along to their children and grandchildren!

Q: What would you like other CID churches to know about Ramsey Plus, or about their possibly getting involved in it?

A: We are very pleased with the quality of the Ramsey Plus videos and materials! For the households who attended, we received heartwarming stories about the changes they have seen in their marriages and lives from following godly principles of financial management. We were so pleased with the feedback from our first FPU course that we took advantage of a special discount from Ramsey Plus and extended our congregational subscription by two years. The extension gave us an unlimited number of household accounts. We have extended the course offerings and free accounts to the community and have had people who did not attend our church take the courses. In one case, a family of five has been attending our church since the parents enrolled in Smart Money Smart Kids. They are now attending FPU and are pursuing Church membership. What a blessing!!

All participants will need to bring the following items: Helmet, ear protection, eye protection, chaps, gloves, steel toed boots, chainsaw, chain-bar oil, and fuel. If members do not have these items, they will be provided to you at the time of training. During the training, you will learn the following:

- safe operation of a chainsaw
- personal protective equipment (PPE)
- injury prevention
- physics of cutting trees
- how to buck and limb fallen trees
- · how to clear debris in a safe and beneficial manner


