Illinois March for Life 2023

On Tuesday March 21, an estimated 3,000-4,000 pro-life citizens joined at the state capitol for the Illinois March for Life. This year the annual event was held in Springfield for the first time.

Prior to the rally and march, some 280 people gathered for a Matins service at Trinity Lutheran Church across the street from the capitol. The service commemorated Joseph, husband of Mary and the Guardian of our Lord. CID President Michael Mohr's sermon noted how Joseph cared for the Child and His mother. We who know the Lord and His love by faith today face a similar challenge to extend love and care to children and their mothers.

President's Desk

Nourishing Mother

Like newborn babes, crave for the pure spiritual milk. (1 Peter 2:2a). These words come into our ears every year the Second Sunday of Easter as the antiphon to the introit for the day. We are reminded by the apostle that we receive our nourishment of the Word of God in like manner as a suckling child receives milk from her mother.

Nourishing Mother. In Latin, the phrase is *alma mater*, the term we use for our schools. Indeed, our institutions of education nourish us with the sweet nectar of knowledge, the facts and figures by which the objective reality of creation is ordered. But life as God's children is more than just facts and figures. The Word of God, while historical, is more than mere history. Here, our Lord proclaims to us His grace, that grace which, when received by faith, strengthens us even unto everlasting life.

In the Collect for the Word, most commonly remembered by many of us as that collect on p. 14 of *The Lutheran Hymnal*, asks for our Lord's strength "that we may so hear [the Scriptures], read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them." Five different verbs to describe our interaction with that nourishing, spiritual milk of the Word of God. This is not a "one-

and-done" endeavor. We are continually interacting with God's Word, constantly learning from Him, ever and always repeating His life-giving Word. And this is no wonder. Whether it be the ancient Romans and

their proverb *repetitio mater studiorum* ("Repetition is the mother of learning") or modern medical academy's "Halsted method" of "See one, do one, teach one," even those outside of the Church see the value of repetition in the process of learning.

Within our congregations, this repetition is most obviously achieved in the systole and diastole of the Church Year, the ebb and flow of the Church ordering her time around the life of Christ and His work in the Church. From the birth of our Lord, and His Epiphany to the Gentiles, His journey to the Cross and catechizing us along the way, His Passion, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension... the pouring out of the Holy Spirit and the growth of the Church in the Triune Name during Trinitytide, the example and teaching of the apostles and the sending out of the Church during Apostlestide, the tribulation of the Church Militant during Martyrstide, the glory of the Church Triumphant during Michaelmastide, the awe and majesty of Last Day as All-Saintstide rolls into Advent. We learn, each year, through this repetition, what it is to be Christ's redeemed people and our place as recipients of His grace.

As this issue of *The GatePost* turns our attention to the various facets of education in our Central Illinois District, remember that learning is not just something you did as a child or in a formal classroom setting. Each and every day we receive from our Heavenly Father, through our nourishing mother, the Church, the blessing of His Word.

Christian Education in the CID

Spring is a time of growth, so it is with our Central Illinois Lutheran Schools.

In the past few months, we have seen several requests in the District office to provide information about expanding or starting schools. This type of interest in expansion is happening across many other Districts throughout Synod. What an exciting time for Christian education! But as with any project, there are many items to consider in starting these needed projects.

The District office encourages any group looking into the expansion or development of a school to reach out to the District office for guidance. Our Synodical Office is available, too, to assist. They can provide guidance through The Genesis Project.

The Genesis Project helps LCMS congregations start Lutheran schools, which include early childhood, elementary, middle, and high school programs. The process begins with the Genesis School Readiness Study. The purpose of the Readiness Study is as follows:

- · To help LCMS congregations and communities gain information on how to start a Lutheran school
- To acquaint Steering Committee members with Lutheran school trends and statistics
- To assess the interest of the congregation(s) in starting a school
- To assess the interest and the ability of parents to send their children to a Lutheran school
- To initially explore potential congregational and third-source funding for a Lutheran school
- To initially explore the market for potential students
- To assess attitudes toward the potential location(s) of the facility
- To provide data and information from which the interested parties can decide on the establishment of a school

Bethel Lutheran High School in Morton has completed its Genesis Project, is now in its second year of operating a Lutheran high school as an expansion of their preschool and elementary school. This next school year, they will add their junior class with a total enrollment of over 20 students.

Immanuel Lutheran Church and Preschools in Charleston has just completed its Genesis Project. They are reviewing the positive report and looking to expand the preschool into an elementary school.

Concordia Lutheran Academy in Geneseo is a classical Lutheran school that opened in 2022 with a kindergarten class. For the 2023-2024 school year, they are adding 1st and 2nd grades. In the future, the plans are to build the school one or two grades at a time to best support students and teachers.

St. John's Lutheran Church and School in Mattoon has plans to expand its elementary school into a high school. They have building plans and are moving forward and raising funds for this fall to support their expansion

St. James Lutheran Church and School in Quincy has just started the Genesis Project to expand their current elementary school into a Lutheran high school.

Altamont area Churches — Several congregations of the Altamont, Effingham, and Shelby circuits are considering planting a Lutheran high school somewhere in their area. There are a variety of Early Childhood and K-8 school ministries already existing, but currently, no Lutheran high school in the area.

We ask for your prayers as these congregations study and seek God's blessings as they plan for their expansions.

LERT Chainsaw Training

The CID Lutheran Early Response Team (LERT) is hosting LERT Basic Chainsaw training on Saturday, May 20, 2023, at St. Peter's Lutheran Church, East Peoria, IL. The training will consist of four hours of instructional-based (Classroom Portion) and four hours of operational-based (Hands-On Portion).

The registration fee (\$35.00) will include a light breakfast, lunch, manual, and credentials card. If you are already LERT Chainsaw certified, the event is considered continuing education, so there is no charge for re-training. Volunteers should be between the ages of 18 and 85. All participants will need to bring the following items: Helmet, ear protection, eye protection, chaps, gloves, steel toed boots, chainsaw, chain-bar oil, and fuel. You must have previously completed the LERT basic training class to participate in this class.

During the training, you will learn the following:

- safe operation of a chainsaw
- personal protective equipment (PPE)
- · injury prevention
- physics of cutting trees
- how to buck and limb fallen trees
- · how to clear debris in a safe and beneficial manner
