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We have now moved past the Lenten Services, Holy Week, Good Friday, and the joyous celebration of Easter. Many of our congregations have completed their confirmation rites. They have added more music and expanded opportunities for worship and fellowship. However, as the disciples did after Easter Sunday, many congregations may experience a slight post-Easter lull, prompting the question, 'Now what?'. This

In John Chapter 21, we see Jesus appearing to the seven disciples who were fishing. After a successful fishing lesson, the disciples catch many fish. Jesus then invites them for breakfast. During this meal, Jesus asks Simon, 'Do you love me?' three times. (vs 15,16, 17 ESV). Simon answers affirmatively each time. Jesus' response to these three confessions is 'Feed my sheep, tend my sheep, feed my sheep.' This interaction with the disciples mirrors our post-Easter experience, when, like the disciples, we may ask, 'Now what?'. Just as Jesus provided a plan forward for the disciples, He does the same for us.

question, echoing the disciples' post-Easter experience, is common for us.

As congregations and individuals, we have many opportunities to feed and tend His sheep. As a Synod, we have developed many ways for us to come together and feed and tend to His sheep. As a Synod, we have a long history of providing Christian education within our Lutheran fiber. We have come together to provide a Lutheran education system that provides education opportunities from early childhood to post-graduate education, including our seminaries. The Central Illinois District and its congregations have also placed a significant investment in our Lutheran Educational system.

In the beginning, many of our Lutheran schools were established for the members of that congregation. But today, most of our Lutheran schools serve both church members and the community. Our schools have become a major mission field. We currently have over 4,000 children attending the schools in our District. Around one-third of those students are from that supporting congregation. While we have a similar number of students who are members of other Christian congregations, we have a growing number of students with no church home. The Synodical average is 27% of the students have no church home. While we are tending and feeding these sheep, the question becomes, 'Now what?'.

Making Disciples for Life

Many schools are seeing an increase in students and families with no-church homes. We have started to feed and tend these families, but the question is how we can connect with these unchurched and dechurched families. We have started a new Synod program within the Central Illinois District to provide guidance. The program is called "Beyond the Classroom". This program is being offered to the schools within our District. The initial goal is to help schools (congregations) determine who these unchurched people are and develop ways to strengthen their connections. And the ultimate goal is bringing more disciples to Christ. We are starting to offer this program in a workshop setting within the schools. We are currently beginning to schedule these workshops over the next 16 months.

## Lutheran Education


Lutheran Education! What's the big deal with "Lutheran Education?!?" I will admit, when I was growing up, I did not understand why my church had a school. We lived quite a ways out of town from our church, so I just walked down the block to my local, public elementary school. Why have a school at the church? This was a question that was not limited to my precocious, seven-year-old brain. There were lots of grown-ups at church that were asking that question, too.

Simply put, the people of God gathered in congregations are commanded to teach their

youth. "Make disciples of all nations by... teaching them all that I have commanded you." (Mt. 28:19-20). "You shall teach [the commands of God] diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise." (Deut. 6:7) These are but the two most commonly quoted of the many passages of Scripture on the subject. But Scripture is clear—we teach our children the handiwork of God.

This handiwork is not just the redeeming work of Christ Jesus, though that is central. This handiwork includes unraveling the mysteries creation—mathematics and biology, astronomy and chemistry and physics—what the Church Fathers referred to as God's "Second Book" - the natural revelation of creation itself. These handiworks of God permeate our lives and are not shrouded behind some imaginary wall separating our faith life from our life in the public square. Parochial schools, Lutheran schools, our schools teach this allencompassing and unredacted truth to all. These schools, aiding parents to fulfill the promise they make at their child's baptism to raise him/her in the fear and knowledge of God, are as much a part of the life and work of the church as our gatherings on Sunday. They are worthy of our prayers to God. They are worthy of our time. They are worthy of our resources and our support.

Every circuit of our Central Illinois District has a school or early learning center. If your congregation is not able to start or operate one on their own, consider how you can help fulfill this command of our Lord through your support of these schools operating near you.



## **Higher Things**

Serving the youth of our congregations, teaching them all that the Lord has commanded us—not only the head knowledge of the words on the page but the actions of how that Word of God permeates all that we think and do and say, is a daunting task. To assist pastors and congregations, our Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod not only employs an entire Youth Ministry department, she has also registered several Recognized Service Organizations (RSOs). One such youth-focused RSO is Higher Things.

Higher Things seeks to make the gifts of Christ Jesus known to youth and young adults. But what does this mean? Recently, HT has helped to make these gifts known online by employing the many voices and talents of our brothers and sisters in Christ from across our church body. HT believes that while the internet cannot replace Word and Sacrament ministry, it does need to try to reach the youth in these areas. They use social media platforms like TikTok and Instagram for bite size lessons and YouTube for deeper content. HT Content points youth and young adults toward Christ crucified for them, the very message they hear in your sanctuary. HT also offers an abundance of curriculum designed to help youth learn, think, and defend their faith with offerings of VBS, confirmation curriculum, High School Bible studies, and more. They help your Church equip youth to stand firm in Christ Jesus. Search for Higher Things on YouTube, Instagram, and TikTok.

But this internet content simply supports the flesh-and-blood encounter with the gifts of Christ. Since 2000, Higher Things has hosted 54 in person and one virtual (thanks COVID!) conference, with three more slotted for the summer of 2024, bringing hundreds of youth together on college campuses. The Word is preached and taught, and the Sacraments are administered. We know that Gen Z is living in a world unlike any we have experienced, but that the same three evil foes attack them daily. Sin, Death, and the Devil don't let up, so we engage them with meaningful conversations in ways that impact their lives and lead them to and keep them in the Church. Your Church.

Higher Things Conferences are designed to encourage, support, and supplement the faith-life of students in the parish, reflecting that ebb and flow of life in the congregation through worship, learning, and just enjoying life together as God's redeemed people. Beginning and ending with Divine Service, youth participate in thirteen opportunities to receive the Gifts of God with Matins, Vespers, Evening Prayer, and Compline scattered throughout the week—all services directly from our Lutheran Service Book and scalable to a gathering of five or five thousand. Four plenary sessions on the main theme of the conference are taught by pastors and expert laity to anchor the teaching component, with five breakaway sessions on issues impacting their daily lives and a panel session where they can anonymously send in the questions and struggles with which they wrestle rounding out the group learning opportunities. And let's not forget the countless opportunities for individual conversations with their pastors, group leaders and other Higher Things staff and speakers.

While our life together in our congregations is derived from and centered on God's gifts, our life together is not only these gifts, and HT conferences include a number of fun, recreational activities. They have everything from laser tag to axe throwing, from Lego building to painting, from talent shows to magicians. They run the kids ragged, ready

to crash with a good night of sleep (ha!) and get back to it in the morning. A week at a Higher Things conference truly is something to experience!

Three or four regional conferences are typically scheduled each year to help facilitate broad geographical participation and keep conferences at a size that fosters those individual conversations mentioned earlier. 2024 brings conferences to the campuses of Concordia University-Wisconsin (in suburban Milwaukee), University of the Ozarks (in Clarksville, Arkansas), and Lewis and Clark College (in Portland, Oregon). While the conferences in Wisconsin and Arkansas have already reached their registration capacity, you can still register for the Portland conference or request a place on the waiting list for the CUW or Arkansas conferences.

## A Dollar for Missions News

## Within about two months ...three Dollar for Missions projects completed, now on to the next!

By early March, 2024, congregations had provided CID sufficient Dollar for Missions (DFM) money fully to fund the first three projects that the District Board of Directors adopted for this year. Funds to support the projects have been or are being disbursed. These projects are:

- 1. \$1,800 for weekly mileage for Pastor David Dunlop from Chestnut to prisons in Lincoln
- 2. \$300 for Spanish-language hymnals for St. John, Beardstown
- 3. \$2,100 to pay honoraria for Pastor Pablo Dominguez to conduct two Spanish language services per month at St. John, Beardstown for half the year.



DFM funds presently received are being devoted to the next designated project, \$10,000 to continue new prison ministries begun in 2024 or to start ministry in prisons or county jails not currently being so served.

CID provides a "thank you" of \$5,000 a year to any of its congregations that "lend" their pastors to the cause of prison ministry one morning, afternoon, or evening a week. Last January, Cristo Rey Lutheran Church, East Moline, started receiving such money in gratitude for Pastor Pablo Dominguez's prison work in Spanish. Present monthly gifts of \$416 to Cristo Rey have been made possible by DFM funds received in 2023.

Other willing pastors and churches are being sought to start new prison ministries! Contact CID Prison Ministry Coordinator Rev. Rodney Blomquist, prisonministry@cidlcms.org

The current DFM project is to make sure new prison ministries that are beginning in 2024 can continue being funded as described above into 2025, or if possible to start wholly new prison ministries during 2025. Congregations make a big difference for this and other projects when they gather from their members one dollar a week over and above regular church giving.

# Keeping Christ on Campus

### 2024 CID Campus Ministry Retreat

This was different – a working retreat!

At the annual CID campus ministry retreat in 2023, students heard a presentation from Dr. Ken Schurb of the District office on Evangelism in the Book of Acts. But on March 9, 2024, this year's retreat participants got involved in evangelism.

They conducted a neighborhood canvass for the only new church start in the District. Immanuel Lutheran Chapel in Springfield conducts services in the "red building" on the District office property. So canvassers were visiting people who live around the District office.



A total of 11 from Eastern Illinois and Illinois State participated, including those accompanying the students. Leading the retreat was Rev. Martin Herzberg, Executive Director of Ongoing Ambassadors for Christ, an organization which has helped many LCMS congregations with such canvassing since 1970. Four other experienced adults from OAFC (two from Illinois, one from Missouri, and one from Ohio) also traveled to Springfield to assist.

Immanuel Lutheran Church in Springfield began conducting services in CID's red building just as COVID restrictions were lifting in May of 2021. At the time, it was not feasible to go from door to door and speak

with people. Volunteers from Our Savior and Trinity, Springfield, including several Lutheran High School, Springfield students, simply hung information packets on doorknobs. Still, one new lady came to church after just that contact!

The personal touch stands out as better, of course. So on March 9, the idea was to speak with people, identify prospects, and if possible give a brief witness to Christ as Savior before leaving their doorstep.

Canvassers actually spoke with 50 people on that Saturday afternoon, yielding three prospects for follow-up by Immanuel and its pastor, Rev. James Stuenkel. Additionally, canvassers left materials for 76 others who did not come to the door. These materials included announcements of Immanuel's Holy Week and Easter services.

By the end of canvassing, everyone was warming to the task at hand. Even students who may have seemed reluctant at first were participating, and excitedly reporting back about the visits they had made.

Thanks to central Illinois Church Extension Fund for supporting not only the retreat but also subsequent evangelism consultations that Rev. Herzberg and Dr. Schurb had first with CID Evangelism Commission, then with Springfield area pastors at their monthly conference. CEF's board chairman, Mr. Darin Gehrke, also took the canvassers out for an appreciative CEF-funded meal at a Springfield restaurant on Saturday evening.

"This was a great event," Dr. Schurb observed. "It showed that, despite rumors to the contrary, door-to-door evangelistic canvassing is not dead."

He added: "It also provided a wonderful opportunity for the college students. If they can speak about Christ with people they have never met, as they did, they can certainly do so with a roommate or classmate back on campus."

## CID Seals New TIME CAPSULE 2023-2073

In a brief ceremony at the CID office on February 27, 2024, several items of interest were sealed in a new time capsule, including a *Lutheran Service Book*, a *Lutheran Study Bible*, and the most recent *Luther's Small Catechism with Explanation*. This dedication follows last spring's opening of the time capsule that was placed in the cornerstone of the original CID office building at 707 N Fifteenth Street some fifty years ago. Additional items in the time capsule include the blueprints of the original office building (from the 1973 capsule), as well as a copy of the newly completed translation (commissioned by the CID Archives) of lectures delivered by Rev. Dr. D.F. Pieper at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis in 1905-1906. This current time capsule will be kept in the District archives and is dated to be opened in another fifty years.
